

IMPACT 2009

HAWC provided the following **free services** in FY 2009:

24-hour hotline: 3,733 individuals were provided information, support and referrals.

Short-term counseling: HAWC provided short-term individual counseling for 637 individuals, helping them to create a safe, violence-free life for themselves and their children.

Support groups: HAWC facilitated ten free, weekly support groups for 149 people.

Children's program: 123 families were counseled through our Parent Child Trauma Recovery Program.

Legal Services: HAWC legal advocates (staff and volunteer) aided 2,146 clients in court and by telephone. 79 people received legal advice in HAWC's *pro bono* law clinics.

Youth Violence Prevention: 7,870 elementary, middle and high school students participated in HAWC's violence prevention education activities.

Emergency Shelter: The HAWC shelter housed 54 adults and 46 children.

Housing and economic stability: 11 adults and 15 children received short-term rental assistance, and 19 adults and 37 children were assisted with relocation expenses and/or utility payments.

Education and training: HAWC staff conducted training sessions in the community, reaching 3,939 people.

Our Mission

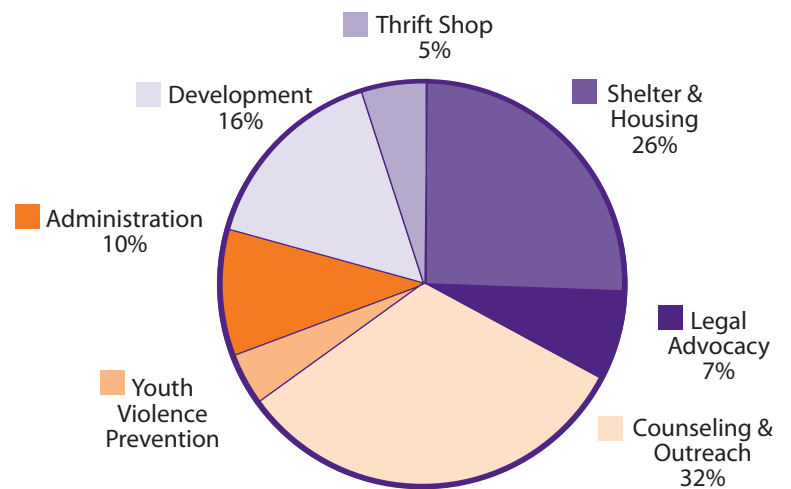
